
Let's do some fun facts:

Ways to Welcome a New Pastor

Welcome your new pastor

- Open your hearts and decide that you are going to love your new pastor.
- Begin praying daily for the new pastor and family.
- Send cards of welcome and encouragement to the incoming pastor.
- Know that welcoming your new pastor in genuine and effective ways lays the ground work for a healthy and vital relationship and the development of stable, long-term ministries together.

Continue the welcome

- Take food over for the first few weeks. Many churches continue the practice of having a "pounding" for the new pastor when persons bring food items.
- Give gift certificates to several of your favorite restaurants in the community.
- Give the pastor and family a welcome reception
- Plan a worship celebration of the new appointment.
- Invite the new pastor to any social events held by Sunday School classes or other groups in the early months.
- Continue to remember your new pastor and family in your daily prayers.

Help the new pastor become familiar with the congregation

- Introduce yourself to the pastor repeatedly!
 You have one name to learn; your pastor has many names to learn.
- Wear name tags. Even if name tags are not a tradition, the congregation can wear them for a few weeks to help the pastor learn names.

- Provide the new pastor with a tour of where things are kept inside the church and perhaps a floor plan of the facilities.
- Orient the new pastor to information systems and the way records are kept.
- Make sure the pastor has a list of home bound or nursing home members, a list of those struggling with long term illness, and a list of those still in grief over recent deaths in the family. Better yet, take the pastor for an introduction to each of these households.
- Have an appropriate person offer to go with the pastor for introductions and support if

there are particularly urgent pastoral situations (a member near death or the family of a member death or the family of a member

> Have a lay official offer to take the pastor to meet church members in their businesses or other work settings, if they are easily accessible.

- Offer to help arrange small group sessions to meet and talk with the congregation.
- Create a "church yellow pages" (a list of people in the church who have specific skills that a newcomer may find beneficial.... auto mechanic, doctor, dentist, dry cleaners, book store, office supply, etc.).

Help the new pastor connect with the community

- Provide a list of hospitals, nursing homes, and community service agencies.
- J Introduce your new pastor to other clergy in the community. Provide information on any ecumenical activities or associations.
- Introduce the new pastor to public and community leaders.
- Ask church members in civic clubs to take the new pastor to one of their meetings.




It was confirmed that Chuck Padfield had been paid for previous years of lawn mowing.



Lydia Project

The United Methodist General Conference will be coming to Minneapolis in 2020. The Dakotas-Minnesota Area has a wonderful opportunity to come together to provide hospitality for this conference.

We intend to greet every delegate, dignitary, bishop, and spouse with a handmade scarf, to serve not only as a memento of General Conference but also as a practical solution to drafty, air-conditioned rooms. That's where you come in!

We are inviting United Methodists in Minnesota, North Dakota, and South Dakota to help us knit or crochet 10,000 purple scarves. We are calling this initiative the Lydia Project, after Lydia in Acts 16.


Each church is asked to designate a contact person for this project. The contact person will be responsible for coming up with an estimated number of scarves your congregation can commit to making. (Contact Mary-Anne Korsch to let her know your number!)

Project Details:

- Scarves should be hand-knitted or hand-crocheted. Since this is a Minnesota event, please use solid purple yarn, like the colors of the Minnesota Vikings or Prince. Royal purple and bright purple are great. Please avoid lavender color and do not use variegated yarn.
-) Please use acrylic yarn that could be washed if needed.
- The pattern can be the creator's choice. Finished projects should be 6-7 inches wide and at least 60 inches long (think about wrapping a scarf around your own neck to stay warm in a drafty room). If you add fringe, which is optional, please be sure that

the scarf itself is at least 60 inches long before the fringe.

When the scarf is package done. individually



- You can download suggested patterns at https://www.dakotasumc.org/ lydiaproject
- Once your congregation commits to creating a specific number of scarves, you will receive that number of tags (at Annual Conference if you stop by the Lydia Project Table, or they can be mailed to you); the tags have a space for the creator to write his or her name and church, and to put a dot on a map of the Dakotas-Minnesota Area that indicates the creator's approximate geographic location. Use a piece of purple yarn to attach a tag to each scarf.
- As the scarves are being created, invite the creators to be in prayer for General Conference 2020, and for the recipient of their scarves.





Groton UMC Building History

A building plan was eventually selected with Richard Ruden chairman of the building committee and Donald Walter as chairman of the building fund committee. Ground breaking and site consecration took place November 19, 1961, with the Rev. R. P. Nielsen presiding. Land, consisting of a full city block, on which to build had been donated by Mrs. Ethel Ragels. Several other lots nearby were donated by Art Thurston and sold, the proceeds used for the building project. The first stage was completed and consecrated June 17, 1962. Dr. Harvey Sander delivered the morning sermon and District Superintendent, Howard Miller and Bishop Edwin R. Garrison highlighting the afternoon service. The building was declared an educational unity and temporary sanctuary. Jay Swisher was Sunday School superintendent and Merrill Rix was the chairman of the official board.

The second stage, that of a sanctuary was started in 1966 with Robert Wehde, chairman. This part, ready for use April 7, 1968, was consecrated with a morning sermon delivered by the Rev. L. A. Kruckenberg and afternoon sermon by Bishop Garrison. K. O. Brekke was resident pastor then.


