Hello Church Family, As the weather cools and Halloween decorations begin filling the front of stores, so begins my favorite time of the year. It's brought a lot of peace to my heart after this wild summer as I watch the season turning and the colors beginning to fade from bright green. Growing up in the Black Hills I was always surrounded by trees, and this week as I watched the leaves begin to change, it felt like home.

Aren't the seasons so incredible to watch? How nature works in this powerful cycle year after year. Trees have always fascinated me, and it's been wonderful to witness the beginning of their leaves changing and soon falling in the backyard. In order to flourish in the new season, the tree must let go of its decayed leaves. Though they have performed well, it is their time.

Fall is an especially wonderful time to observe nature. As we watch the swirling leaves stirred by the wind, I am reminded that they display an important lesson for all of us to follow. Just as the trees



don't stubbornly hold on to their dead leaves, we shouldn't hold on to any of the unnecessary weight in our lives. When we find ourselves longing for a new season, the old can easily inhibit the new if we allow it.

To release negativity in our lives, we must first identify it. How can we do this?

» By asking God to help us let go of the guilt from the past.

Jesus longs to empower and strengthen us for the new season ahead. If we're not sure of the issues keeping us from a kind and compassionate spirit, He will show us when we ask. And if guilt from the past is preventing this beautiful new season, we have His promises to hold close.

Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland. Isaiah 43:18,19 (NIV)

What are you holding

on to that is preventing a freshness to the season ahead? Could it be that the decayed leaves are piling up and your heart needs to discard them for good? If so, reach out to the Lord in prayer. He wants to hear from you. Ask Him to shine light on any thoughts, circumstances, habits or other "decayed leaves" you might be clinging to. As you watch the leaves fall this season, my prayer is that you are reminded to let go of anything that would hinder a fresh relationship with God and a new season.

daughter's] language ... they would sound more like 'Marlo no cry. Marlo be happy.'"



What you need:

- 1/4 cup maple syrup
- 1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- ²/₃ cup pecan pieces
- 1/3 cup roasted pumpkin seeds
- 1/3 cup almonds
- 1/4 cup raisins
- ²/₃ cup dried fruit (any)

What you do:

- Microwave syrup, spices, seeds and nuts for 30 seconds at a time, stirring frequently, until mixture thickens.
- Spread the mixture on a baking sheet lined with wax paper. Let cool and harden.
- Break the candied nuts into chunks. Combine with dried fruit.
- 4. Store in airtight container.

Chairman Brad Morehouse called the meeting to order at 7:06 pm. Those in attendance were: Pastor Brandon Dunham, Marjorie Overacker, Jeanne Wanous, Brent Morehouse, Linda Thurston, Dale Kramer, Meri Erickson, and Allen Walter. Pastor Brandon shared a prayer prior to the business meeting.

The agenda & previous meeting minutes were approved on a motion by Marjorie Overacker

Correspondence: A thank you note from the Groton Summer Transition Program was shared. The group also donated \$100 to our church for the use of our facility.

<u>**Treasurer's Report</u>**: The monthly report was reviewed and found to be favorable. The report was approved on a motion by Brent Morehouse.</u>

<u>Financial Secretary</u>: A finance committee meeting needs to be scheduled. Pastor Brandon will schedule this.

Pastor Parish Relations: Meri Erickson stated that the bill for installation of wood flooring in the two upstairs bedrooms at the parsonage will be paid. On a motion by Marjorie Overacker, the council approved moving PPR funds into the parsonage maintenance funds sub account to facilitate payment of the floor installation bill.

<u>Bills</u>: None to approve, however there is still an outstanding balance to be paid to McGannon Plumbing & Heating.

Administrative Report: Pastor Brandon stated that the Sunday school kickoff went well with many people involved. Also, our Children & Youth Ministry Cohort group will be traveling to Storm Mountain in Rapid City for their second training session on October 12, 2019.

Trustees:

- Brad Morehouse shared that a water leak in the coffee room had been discovered. It has since been fixed.
- Brad also reported that despite several requests for Aberdeen Glass to come and investigate sanctuary window leaks, they still have not responded with an onsite visit.
- Brent Morehouse reported that the northeast bedroom of the parsonage basement has been gutted. Paneling and stud boards were found to be moldy. Perry Blocker will give an estimate to sheet rock those walls in February.
- The outside of the parsonage needs painting. The PPR committee will arrange to have this done after colors are picked out.

Past and Upcoming Events

Vacation Bible School that was held on July 25th and 26th was discussed. We felt it was successful with about 18 kids enrolled. Changes that were discussed included: having it for about four days, time in summer vacation, advantages of evening or morning sessions and ways to inform parents. The expenses will be taken out of the Education Fund designated in our budget. Fifteen School Kits were put together for UMCOR and each child attending also got a bag of school supplies. A lot of time and effort was put forth to decorate and prepare for only two days. It would also be nice to have an evening for a short program.

Mission Projects - More School Kits and also Health Kits will be assembled for UMCOR. Donations started coming in after this meeting, and at this time (September 16th) Donna Hearnen, Missions Chairman has purchased items for 15 more school kits and 13 Health kits. These will be taken up to Jobbers Movers in Aberdeen. They transport them out to Salt Lake City to a distribution center. From there, they are shipped to areas in the United States that need them. We pay \$1 per kit for this part of the shipping and also another \$1 for toothpaste for

each Health Kit.

Pastor Brandon gave us the dates that he would be gone (October 13 & December 29). He also said he would have an Advent Bible Study. Time and subject will be discussed later.
