...Pastor Rob's Ponderings

Wonderfully Made

Psalm 139:14: I will praise you for I am fearfully and wonderfully made.

As I travel from church to church I listen to books to keep up with my "reading." I'm finishing a book entitled, "Face in the Mirror." It is the story of the first face transplant ever performed at the Mayo Clinic. I had never heard of this kind of transplant before and it sounded like a fascinating story of a man who had tried to commit suicide receiving the face of man (formerly of Fulda, SD) committed suicide. The book tells the story not only of the young man but the lead surgeon and his extensive surgical team performing a surgery which lasted over 50 hours. The story goes in to detail on all the considerations and practice needed to replace bones, nerves, veins, arteries, even tear ducts, and making sure the brain receives the signals from nerve endings to smile or blink.

I was reminded of my good friend, Dr. Dan Hay-ward. Dan and I went to college together. I visited him when he was at the University of Oklahoma Medical School. As we talked about his classes, Dan said being in medical school reaffirmed and strengthened his faith in Jesus. He said, "My professors all believe in evolution but when you work on a cadaver



in anatomy class, you realize only a divine Creator could make all the nerve endings, veins, and muscles work in the exact way they need to function."

I was reminded of that yesterday (I'm writing this on June 24, 2025) when I was in surgery at St. Luke's Hospital in Aberdeen to receive a skin graft over the open wound I had on my left foot. The open wound was actually created by the same surgeon doing the skin graft. On Easter Monday, I was diagnosed with necrotizing fasciitis, a type of flesh-eating bacteria (No, we don't know where I acquired it.). The surgeon said we needed to clean out all the bacteria and make sure it never returns. I was in the hospital for two weeks undergoing surgeries every couple of days to clean out my left foot and

lower leg. Even after returning home, I was required to return to the St. Luke's Wound Care Clinic for repeated cleaning of the wound and re-bandaging. Finally, after many weeks, the surgeon pronounced the large hole he opened to "clean me out" could be closed with a skin graft.

Do you know how a skin graft works? A surgeon takes a piece of your own skin, usually from the thigh or buttocks, and sews it to another part of your body that needs covering. The place the skin was taken from feels like you might have skidded over asphalt for about a week, and there is no pain where the surgeon sewed on the skin. My question: How did they learn to do all this?!!!

Dr. Steve Seamands, a professor at Asbury Theologi-

cal Seminary and one of my professors, wrote a book, "Follow the Healer," in which he discusses the biblical concept of healing. In one of the chapters he outlines the various ways God heals, one of which is by medical knowledge. In other words, God has given my friend, Dr. Hayward, and my surgeon, Dr. Wobst, the ability to learn and "figure things out." It's amazing!

And that's why I'm saying: I will praise you for I man fearfully and wonderfully made. See you in church!

How it's observed:

Many Major League Baseball teams recognize Purple Heart recipients during games on August 7th. Government offices and veteran organizations also hold remembrance events.

National Purple Heart Day is a time to express gratitude to those who have served and sacrificed for their country.





Groton Ad Council - July

Chairman, AM Mitchell, called the meeting to order. In attendance were AM Mitchell, Pastor Rob Moorlach, Jeanne Wanous, Cliff & Carna Pray, Anita Lowary, and Allen Walter. Pastor Rob shared a prayer prior to conducting business.

Both the agenda and the previous minutes were approved on a motion by Anita Lowary.

Correspondence: Jeanne Wanous shared a notice from Plunkett's Pest Control regarding a 4% price increase for their pest control service at our church for the upcoming fall season. Ad Council members agreed that we would continue using Plunkett's even with the slight price increase.

Committee Reports

Membership—Anita Lowary: no new updates

Memorial—no report

Missions - Val Baker: Carna Atherton-Pray shared what was discussed and planned at the recent Missions meeting. The group plans to do school bag collections in the fall in conjunction with Rally Day. The items collected will be sent to the UMCOR missions. Additional plans include building children's beds with the Sleep in Heavenly Peace organization in Aberdeen. At Christmas time, the Missions committee plans to conduct a Spirit Lake Christmas hygiene kit collection. Caring Team: no report

<u>Pastor/Parish Relations</u>: Carna noted that the PPR committee will meet on Wednesday, July 23 in the evening. They will be discussing the 2026 budget to include the pastor's salary and all other budget items.

Trustees—Cliff Pray: Cliff reported on the following items:

<u>Front door</u>: The church front door has been updated to allow for emergency opening from the inside of the building

even though it is locked to keep outside intruders from entering. Those who serve Sunday morning coffee should be trained in how to use the new door features so that the door can be routinely unlocked for Sunday morning services and then locked again after attendees have left the building.

Air Conditioner Maintenance: Derwin Kampa completed maintenance on the church air conditioner. Cliff also asked him to look at the parsonage furnace. The result is that the parsonage furnace is outdated and if it fails, we would not be able to get parts for it. Also, if the furnace would have to be replaced, the air conditioner would also need to be replaced. Derwin provided an estimate of \$12,000 for a new furnace and AC at current prices. To be clear, there is no need for replacement of either unit at this point in time.

Parish Updates: Updates at the parish are complete and the bill has been paid.

Treasurer's Report:

Church Treasurer-Jeanne Wanous:
Annual Weed Spraying—Jeanne reminded the council that we will have a bill in the fall for annual weed spraying by Neil Abeln which was \$130 last fall. There were no objections to continuing this weed prevention service.

Monthly Dakotas Conference Apportionments: Jeanne reminded the council that when we set the 2025 budget for the Dakotas Conference monthly apportionments at 25% of the normal suggested amount by the conference, that we agreed to relook at our circumstances at midyear. After some discussion, Carna Atherton-Pray motioned to increase our monthly apportionments from 25% to 50% of the suggested amount. The motion was seconded and all voted in favor of the mo-

tion. All members agreed that we will revisit this when planning our 2026 budget. 2026 Utilities: Members discussed that our monthly utilities bills will probably go up by 10 – 12% next year.

<u>Financial Secretary</u>-Allen Walter: Allen asked that Carna contact a Vanco representative to come to visit with us about other methods for members of the congregation to give to the church.

Pastor Parish-Meri Erickson: no report

Bills to be Presented:

The House of Glass bill for the new front door locking system was \$618 and has been paid.

Administrative Report: Pastor Rob stated that he feels the Groton/Conde/Britton services are going well. He said that Britton's weekly attendance has increased. Pastor Rob has realized that he does have enough time after the Groton service to stay a while and greet attendees as they leave, which everyone agreed is very important to our members. He also shared an update on his health and feels he is nearing the end of his routine treatments. He reminded everyone that Groton's VBS will be July 28 & 29 and that he will be on vacation on Aug. 10.

Old Business:

Fellowship Hall Chair Cleaning: Meri Erickson volunteered to do the chair cleaning. She also feels that the fellowship hall carpeting is in need of cleaning soon. There is no plan for cleaning the sanctuary pew pads yet.

New Business: none

The meeting was adjourned at 7: 45 pm. Secretary, Jeanne Wanous
