
...Pastor Rob's Ponderings

There's a verse I read recently which bothers me. Many verses in scripture bother me but this one more than others, especially this week. In Luke 9:62 Jesus tells a would-be disciple, "Anyone who puts a hand to the plow and then looks back is not fit for the Kingdom of God." Jesus is saying, "You don't have time to go home and relive the past, today is the day to follow me."

This verse bothers me because I love to relive the past, especially around the 4th of July. I love to think back on the fireworks "fights" my brothers and I took part in. I love to remember blowing up stuff or scaring people with unexpected firecrackers. Isn't that what the 4th of July is all about? Actually, Yes and No.

No to all the hijinks of kids playing with fireworks, although I still chuckle about some of the foolish things we did.

Yes to the looking back and remembering the past. It's important to remember where we came from, how our country started, how we progressed through the years (even recalling the mistakes and outright blunders), and honoring those men and women who give us the ability to sing "America the



Beautiful" with one voice.

So what is Jesus telling this would-be disciple about the past? I believe Jesus is saying, "Remember the past and its lessons, but don't live there. Have you ever tried to drive backwards for a long distance using only mirrors and looking back? I missed a stop once on my school bus route so the kids on the bus yelled, "Mr. Moorlach! Our stop is back there!" I had driven a mile past the driveway. Thinking it was safe to simply back up on this lonely gravel road, I shifted the bus to reverse and started back. What I thought would be a simple maneuver turned into a nerve-wracking ordeal. Frequent braking, turning the steering wheel in one direction then another, repeatedly

checking the mirrors finally got me back to the proper driveway, but when I looked at the traveled road it looked like the curviest roller coaster ever made. I understand what Jesus was talking about.

One of my high school friends told me many years ago he wanted to move back "to our hometown" in order to raise his kids the way we were raised. He moved back but everything had changed. The town was now a city. The school was three times as large; no small classes. My friend had a job but it was with family and he discovered even the work habits and attitudes of his family had changed. Within three years my friend moved to another state, even another part of the country.

We forget our national past was not even as rosy as we remember. The 1960's had the Vietnam War, race riots, assassinations and college campus unrest. Sound familiar?

Jesus says, "Move forward!" The roads will not be easy. He was on the way to Jerusalem and the cross. But learn the lessons of the past. Give thanks for those who gave us a country of liberty, even when it took us awhile to get there. And put your faith in Jesus.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE 2025 ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Seventy-two hours. 400 people. Gallons of coffee. Laughter, tears, and celebrations. Hard conversations, worship, and learning. All wrapped in the powerful movement of the Holy Spirit. This is the 2025 Dakotas Annual Conference.

Theme: Drawing on 1 John 4, the theme of this year's conference was "Created to love BOLDLY." Throughout the gathering, Bishop Lanette, worship leaders, and presenters lifted up ways to live this theme in our ministry and discipleship. Teaching and workshop times laid out practice examples of how United Methodists across the Dakotas and the larger connection are putting this bold love into action.

Bishop's Episcopal Address: Bishop Lanette Plambeck delivered the 2025 Episcopal Address on Friday, June 6, 2025. She shared the many ways that the goodness of God's love has been present in the past and will be lived out in the future for The United Methodist Church and the Dakotas Conference. "I want you to love God with such a desperate love, that you cannot help but tell your neighbor about the saving grace of God," said Bishop Lanette. [Watch the Episcopal Address.](#)

Missional Report: The 2024-25 Missional Report reminded attendees at the 32nd Session of the Dakotas Conference that we were created to love boldly. This isn't just the annual conference theme or logo—it is our identity and purpose—a calling that Dakotas United Methodists have been living passionately this past year. Theologian in Residence: Rev. Dr. Tim Eberhart, Dakotas Conference elder and associate professor of Ecological Theology and

Drawing from our Wesleyan theology and heritage, Eberhart identified ways that our ecclesial DNA has given us the resources and framework to face the challenges in our world in this time in history. Legislation: Voting members of the 32nd Session of the Dakotas Annual Conference affirmed all the legislation before them including the 2026 Budget Proposal, a resolution to create a Conference Green Team and Caretakers of God's Creation Coordinator, Reaffiliation Policy, and updates to the Conference Structure and Rules of Order. 
Miracle Offering worship: When Rev. Jennifer McDonald was 17 years old, she preached a message on Youth Sunday. It was based on 1 John 4. PATRIOTIC PINWHEEL

Create this colorful July 4th craft.

What you need:

- Decorated card stock square (5" x 5")
- Scissors
- Hole punch
- 2 one-inch circles of card stock
- Glue
- Pipe cleaner (3 inches)
- Drinking straw



What you do:

1. Fold the square corner to corner to form an X. Unfold.
2. To make spokes, cut the four creases until an inch from the center.
3. Punch a hole in the middle of the square, near the tips of each spoke, and in the middle of each circle.
4. Fold each spoke toward the center, lining up the holes. Glue in place.
5. Wrap one end of the pipe cleaner around the top of the straw. Thread a circle, the pinwheel, and the remaining circle onto the pipe cleaner.
6. Roll the pipe cleaner end into a ball. Then spin!

What happened in 1955? - 70 years ago?

1955 was a year of significant events in politics, culture, and technology. Key happenings include the opening of Disneyland, the launch of the Warsaw Pact, and the start of the Montgomery bus boycott. Other notable events include the first McDonald's restaurant opening, the Salk polio vaccine being declared safe, and the death of actor James Dean.

Jul 2 "Lawrence Welk Show" premieres on ABC

Jul 11 Congress authorizes all US currency to say "In God We Trust"

Jul 17 Disneyland televises its grand opening in Anaheim, California.

Swiss electrical engineer George de Mestral is granted a patent for the **Velcro fabric hook-and-loop fastener**. Tappan introduce the first domestic microwave oven, in the United States. American electrical engineer Eugene Polley invents the Zenith Flash-Matic, the first

wireless television remote control.

In 1955, a brand new car cost around \$1,900, while the average home was about \$18,400. A gallon of regular gasoline was \$0.25, and a gallon of milk was \$0.86. A dozen eggs cost \$0.65 and a loaf of bread was \$0.15. **Sugar, 5 lb.: \$0.52** bottle of Coca-Cola was set at **five cents**

McDonald's first opened in 1955, and burgers were just **15 cents**

Chairman AM Mitchell called the meeting to order. Those in attendance were AM Mitchell, Jeanne Wanous, Cliff & Carna Pray, Anita Lowary, and Allen Walter. Carna Atherton-Pray shared a prayer prior to conducting business.

Both the agenda and the previous minutes were approved on a motion by Anita Lowary.

Committee Reports

Membership—Anita Lowary: Anita shared a draft of a membership status update form that could be sent by text or email. Carna Atherton-Pray moved to use the format shared by Anita to contact members who we are not certain want to remain members of the Groton UMC congregation. We are obligated to send these members three notices before we can remove them from our membership list. The motion was seconded and approved.

Memorial—Linda Thurston: Although there was no report, council members shared great reviews of the new garbage cans recently purchased by the Memorial committee.

Missions - Val Baker: Val was not present, but Carna Atherton-Pray shared that she found out we could still do kits for UMCOR, so the Missions committee may plan for that. In addition, Carna mentioned the possibility of participating in the Sleep in Heavenly Peace organization in Aberdeen. Their mission is: NO KID SLEEPS ON THE FLOOR IN OUR TOWN!. And also, our missions committee will plan to do some special activity at Christmas time.

Caring Team: no report

Pastor/Parish Relations: Carna reported that this committee will begin to look at their budget for 2025. Carna also reported that she attended the 32nd Annual Da-

kotas Conference in Mitchell on June 6-8, 2025.

Trustees—Cliff Pray: Cliff reported on the following items:

Front door: The House of Glass, Aberdeen, has found a way to change the front door of the church to allow people to exit even when the door is locked. This is crucial in case of emergencies. The approximate cost will be in the \$600 range. Anita Lowary motion to authorize Cliff to have House of Glass change the locking mechanism of the front door to address safety concerns at the rate of approximately \$600. The motion was seconded and passed.

Front Hallway Leak: A water leak was discovered in the front hallway. Cliff had Hub City Roofing come out to investigate. They found cracked caulking and fixed it. In addition, they checked all around the roof for any other issues. They didn't find any other issues, but did report that the roof is getting worn, and that we should keep an eye on it. As a side note, they said that any future caulking repairs must be done with a masonry type caulk.

Parsonage Update: Cliff reported that the update of the parsonage bathroom is going very well and should be done by June 23. All plans and details fall under the Pastor/Parish committee which includes Conde/Groton/and Britton.

Treasurer's Report:

Church Treasurer-Jeanne Wanous:

The BAGS Program Update: Although it had been reported earlier that the BAGS Program had completely transferred to the school, Anita Lowary reported that it had not completely transferred. Anita still must meet with the Groton Area School treasurer to finalize the transfer. Once the transfer is complete, the Groton UMC

Cleaning of Chairs & Pews: The council discussed the need to clean the fellowship hall chairs and also the sanctuary pew pads. A date of July 10 at 1:00 pm was set for this task to take place. Anyone who is willing and able is asked to come and help with this long overdue task.

The meeting was adjourned at 7: 45 pm.
