## ...Pastor Rob's Ponderings

#### **CHANGE**

A cliché' says, "Times they are a-changin." I would add that word to another cliché' which says, "There are three things you can count on in life—death, taxes and change."

In our area we are in the middle of change as harvest season continues, temperatures start dropping, mosquitoes are dying, and the winds come more from the North than from any other direction. Fall is my favorite time of year. The colder temperatures, mosquitoes dying, Thanksgiving and Christmas are around the corner, mosquitoes are dying, basketball season is getting ready, mosquitoes are dying. Did I already say that? It really is a season of change. Driving around the countryside, what was once green and colorful is now yellow, gold and harvested. The other day in church someone was "thanked" for "cleaning up the flower beds;" it was another reminder of the changing seasons.

The comment also reminded me of one of my favorite bible verses. Peter quotes Isaiah 40:8 as he writes in I Peter 1:24-25, "The grass withers; the flowers fade but the Word of the Lord remains forever." Change has been part of our lives since the day we were conceived. I drove past a bill-board not long ago which reminded me the human heart



starts beating about five weeks after conception. And there's more than a few more weeks until the baby is born! A lot of things can change in those weeks. I viewed a post on Facebook recently from a friend celebrating her son's last high school football game. In the post she shared pictures of her son playing pee-wee, junior high, and high school football. The son is unrecognizable from one stage to the next.

We have been in the Gospel of Luke in recent weeks in church. One person who is always recognizable is Jesus, the Word. Did you know John starts his gospel by saying, "In the beginning the Word already existed. The Word was with God and the Word was God." He's talking about Jesus, not just simply the word we think of as the Bible.

What I'm learning and realizing is Jesus is the Bible. It's all about Him. Jesus told the religious leaders of the day, "You search the Scriptures because you think they give you eternal life. But the scriptures point to me! (John 5:39) You want to know what Jesus thought about a certain issue? Read the Word. You want to know what will happen tomorrow? Read the Word. You want to try to find the purpose to all the change we go through? Read the Word.

Did you know of the 300 questions Jesus asked people in the Gospels, the most common question was, "Have you not read?" (asked 7 different times)

I realize this might sound a bit "old-fashioned." After all, most people have cell phones or "smart phones," even my 84 year old mother has a smart phone. Yesterday I walked into an office and one of the older people in the office was actually playing a game on his smart phone while trying to take part in a conversation. Times certainly have changed but the importance of knowing the word of God and more importantly, the Word of God has not. If you need resources to better get into and read God's Word, I hope you reach out to me. Many bible resources are free and easy to access, even from your smart phone.

Change might be, and certainly is, happening all around us, but the Word of the Lord remains forever.





Dear Beloved in Christ,

Grace and Peace to you in the name of the one who brings forth the harvest and invites us to be co-laborers in sowing God's abundant love.

This past month, the appointive cabinet had the opportunity to hold our monthly meeting at the United Methodist Church in Wall, SD. While I was there, I happened to thumb through an old hymnal that was in our meeting room and discovered a hymn I was not familiar with, "God, Whose Farm is All Creation." It begins with these words:

"God, whose farm is all creation, take the gratitude we give;

take the finest of our harvest, crops we grow that we may live."

Each year, Thanksgiving invites us to pause, to notice God's abundant provision, and to respond with hearts of gratitude and generosity. We are reminded that all we have—the resources we steward, the relationships we care for, the talents we engage, even the very breath in our body—is a gift from our Creator who tends the vast "farm of all creation."

This year, as we reflect on the many blessings that sustain us, I invite you to consider how we might extend that blessing to our neighbors through the 2025 Thanksgiving Offering.

Across North and South Dakota, families are struggling to meet their most basic needs. Many are uncertain where their next meal will come from, how they will afford their heating bill this winter, or

how to pay for critical medical care.

## **Charge Conference Minutes**

#### Groton/Conde/Britton United Methodist Churches

The Groton/Conde/Britton Parishes of the United Methodist Church held its annual charge conference at the Groton church on October 11, 2025, at 12:00 pm. Those in attendance were: Northeast District Superintendent Rev. Kris Mutzenberger; attending from Groton were Pastor Rob Morlach, Carna Atherton-Pray, AM & Laurie Mitchell, Linda Thurston, and Jeanne Wanous; attending from Conde was Patty Knoll; and attending from Britton were Ron Binger and Deena Heitmann.

The meeting opened with a devotional scripture from John 4:7-12 and Matthew 28:18-20. Rev. Mutzenberger asked each person in attendance to share how their congregations have loved boldly; how God has been at work in their church or community; how we are all being called to serve in mission in our communities; and where we are all raising a hallelujah for what God is doing.

After a prayer, Kris began the Business Meeting of the Charge Conference by asking each church to discuss and plan our respective church's missions and action plans for 2026.

The balance of the business meeting included:

- Review of membership rolls for all three churches.
  - ◆ Some corrections were made to Britton's membership list
  - The corrected membership list was adopted and all members voted YES.
- Review of all 2026 leaders for Groton, Conde, & Britton.
  - Leaders voted yes to all leaders listed.
- Pat & Loren Siefke were voted to

- continue as lay leadership.
- ◆ The Parish budget was reviewed. There were no budget changes except for an increase in Pastor Rob's salary, which was approved by all present.
- Members present Voted YES on a total of \$57,000 annual compensation for Pastor Rob and in favor of designating \$4000 as a housing exclusion.
- The Parish Budget was adopted as listed.
- It was noted that all churches completed their annual audits.
- The Conde & Britton church budgets were approved by all present.
- The Groton Ad Council still needs to complete a vote of approval for their 2026 budget.
- All three churches are reminded to review their "Safe Sanctuary" Policies and document approval.

Rev. Kris Mutzenberger closed the Annual Charge Conference with a prayer.

- Construction paper in a variety of fall colors
- Pencil, marker, or crayons
- Yarn, ribbon, or raffia
- Scissors

## A Thanksgiving Hymn That Sees God's Hand Everywhere

For a hymn that captures the beauty and gratitude of Thanksgiving, All Things "Bright and Beautiful" is a perfect choice Its lyrics paint vivid pictures — flowers opening in the morning sun, birds singing, golden sunsets, purple-topped mountains and rivers rushing by. It all leads to this joyful reminder: "He gave us eyes to see them, and lips that we might tell: How great is God Almighty, who has made all things well."

The hymn was written by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818–1895), an Irishwoman with a passion for teaching children about God. She wrote many hymns for her Sunday school class, later collected in *Verses for Holy Seasons*.

But her ministry went beyond music — she spent her life serving the poor, comforting the sick, and caring for the grieving. When she passed away, "a great throng" gathered to remember her, honoring both her faith and the beauty she shared with the world.

## Groton Ad Council - Oct

Chairman, AM Mitchell, called the meeting to order. In attendance were Pastor Rob Moorlach, AM Mitchell, Jeanne Wanous, Lon Gelhauss, Cliff & Carna Atherton-Pray, and Linda Thurston. Pastor Rob shared a prayer prior to the discussion of business.

Both the agenda and the previous minutes were approved.

#### **Committee Reports**

Membership—Anita Lowary: no updates Memorial— Linda Thurston shared that the annual All Saints Day will be observed on Sunday, Nov. 2, during our normal worship service. Linda will also be sharing information on the Bibles the Groton UMC presents to our children annually. Funding for these Bibles comes from the Memorial fund.

Missions - Val Baker/Carna Atherton-Pray: Carna reported that the coat collection has ended, and our Groton collection will be added to the Aberdeen North Highlands collection. Groton's next project will be Spirit Lake.

<u>Caring Team—Jolene Townsend:</u> no report

<u>Pastor/Parish Relations</u>: Carna noted that this committee is done with their work for the year.

Trustees—Cliff Pray: no updates

#### Treasurer's Report:

<u>Church Treasurer</u>-Jeanne Wanous:

Church Mutual Insurance is redesigning their billing system, giving us more control over billing.

MGT Insurance Company's annual premium is set for auto-withdrawal on Nov. 6. There were some questions regarding coverage under the policy as well as current premiums. Pastor Rob volunteered to investigate the specific questions.

Tax Exempt Form: We are required to complete an updated tax-exempt form

periodically for the Director of Equalization. Pastor Rob kindly volunteered to complete this form.

<u>Financial Secretary</u>-Allen Walter: no report

Pastor Parish-Meri Erickson: no report

#### Administrative Report: Pastor Rob

Pastor Rob reviewed confirmation plans and an upcoming service for these students on November 16, 2025. Plans are also being made for a service in early 2026 for those who want to join the Groton UMC.

Our church is required to review our current Safe Sanctuary policy which was approved in 2008. Pastor Rob stated that there is now a new recommendation to update our policy to meet suggestions under the Safer Sanctuary suggestions & requirements. Pastor Rob recommended that a task force of himself, Carna Atherton-Pray, and Meri Erickson be appointed to complete a review and author suggestions for an updated policy. Linda Thurston motioned to appoint a threeperson committee consisting of Pastor Rob, Carna Atherton-Pray, and Meri Erickson to review our current policy and make suggestions for an updated policy as well as report their findings and proposals at the November 2025 Groton UMC Ad Council meeting. The motion was unanimously approved.

#### **Old Business:**

The BAGS program transfer from Groton UMC to Groton Area School Anita Lowary, who has managed the BAGS program for the Groton United Church since approximately 2011, reported that all management and bank accounts have been turned over to the Groton Area School as both parties had agreed to do. She noted that over approximately 13 years the BAGS program had spent approximately \$18,000 on food for the pro-

gram. Total assets rolled over to the Groton Area School was \$14,400. The Groton UMC would like to thank Matt Johnson for his many hours of help with groceries through Kens Fairway over these 13 years. Matt will continue to assist the Groton Area School in the same capacity.

#### **New Business:**

Pastor Rob shared that the Brown County Child Protection Services has asked Groton UMC if they could utilize the children's playroom at our church for a two-hour session on Monday's from 3:00 pm to 5:00 pm through May of 2026. After discussion, Carna Atherton-Pray motion to allow the request. Lon Gellhaus 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion and the motion was approved. Any further details will be managed through Pastor Rob.

Groton UMC 2026 Budget: Roger Rix, Finance Chair, will need to review the proposed budget with the Finance Committee and submit their proposal at the November 2025 Ad Council meeting to be voted on.

Ad Council meeting time for the winter months: AM Mitchell proposed changing our monthly meetings to daylight hours through the winter. Members will revisit the suggestion at the November meeting.
